QUO-VADIS TRADITIONAL MEDIA?

n July 15, 2019, New Straits Times (NST) celebrates its 174 years of existence. NST was first established in 1845. It was founded as The Straits Times but later reestablished as the New Straits Times in August 31, 1974. The paper served as Malaysia's only broadsheet English language newspaper before turning into a tabloid or compact version that rolled off the presses on September 1, 2004. Since April 18, 2005, the newspaper has been published only in the tabloid size, ending a 160-year-old tradition of broadsheet publication.

Last month, one of Asia's most esteemed English dailies, Thailand's The Nation daily newspaper in Bangkok ceased its print edition after 48 years of being available on newsstands. Famed for its independent news reporting, The Nation's management said that the organization is to become a fully online publication. On November 31, 2018, the Malay Mail newspaper had taken the same approach when they stopped the print edition after 122 years in existence and moved fully into the digital era – a move that would see it follow in the footsteps of many a newspaper before it.

In the robust digital era, much has been said and argued about the traditional media survival, i.e. newspapers and many other traditional news platforms. Could traditional media survive in the stiff competition of digital media. A former editor-in-chief of The Nation, Suthicai Yoon, 73, in an interview with the Malaysian National News Agency (Bernama) remarked that print newspapers are "fading into darkness".

"There are no other option for the other print media but to jump into digital journalism," Suthicai said. "If you are good at print journalism, and if you know how to learn new skills, you will be very good at digital journalism," Suthicai added.

Due to the tremendous impact of the digital media, we are now observing rapid changes in the local media industry. The sale of the local daily newspapers has been slowly declining. The NSTP group is one of the examples, wherein, they have shifted to multiple platforms instead of solely focusing on print media. Readers of today are also more sophisticated, selective and always in-hurry. By clicking their apps, they are able to glance through information and news. The situation now has changed, unlike the 70s or 80s when most people heavily relied on the newsapaper as the main source of information. Today information is at their fingertips. Even television is no longer a choice for general viewers. Digital media, undoubtedly has changed the landscape of news in Malaysia and around the globe.

Despite the new media threats against traditional media, we should not be pessimistic at all. Way forward shows journalism is still a relevant discipline, but we will surely see a new shift in terms of news format, approach, platform, dissemination and presentation. Digital media will be more prominence as compared to traditional media platforms. It is also high time for mass communication educators to reflect, rethink, and review comprehensively the syllabus of mass communication and media studies in tandem with the dynamic progress of the digital media age!



"SPREAD THE LOVE" DAY AT SEMARAI

The students of the School of and **Business** Management (SOMB) are required to take the Co-Curriculum subject in our last semester in order to attain the necessary credits and complete the diploma in 2.5 years. In order to successfully relate the knowledge of outdoor community activities and services delivered to them in class, they had a charity event titled 'Spread the Love' at Semarak Resource Centre which is located at Taman Semarak. 71800 Nilai, Negeri Sembilan.





The participants of this charity event are the last semester students of Diploma in Business Administration of the May 2017 intake, with the guidance of Ms Nurul Saadatun Nadiah Mohd Ngah. The charity event took place on the 27th of April 2019. There were 18 children involved in the event, ages from 8 years old to 10 years old; 10 girls and 8 boys.

After the breakfast session, the event began at 10.00 am with a wonderful opening speech by Shafeeqah, the student representative. The first game of the day was 'Blowing the Balloon'. The game was to blow the balloon given to them until it is broken. The instructions were given to the children by the emcee of the day. Firstly, the children were given a balloon for each and after the whistle was blown, the children were asked to blow the balloon and break it. Almost all the children were able to complete the game successfully, whereas the small ones found it difficult to break it, so the students helped them to break the balloon. Everyone enjoyed including the volunteers because of their smiles and the sound of their laughter.

Next game was 'Balloon Blasting'. Which was similar to the first game, but this was done in pairs. The volunteers helped to blow the balloons and tie it. The game was to have a balloon in between two children facing the opposite direction, where they must break the balloon by holding their hand and pushing themselves towards each other to break it. 10 girls were separated into 5 pairs and the 8 boys were separated to 4 pairs. Each pair came one after a pair to play this game. All the children cheered for their friends and enjoyed themselves very much, which was the main goal during the day, to see them smile and enjoy themselves.

The third game was the two-legged race. There are about 18 children and they were divided into groups of 5 each; including 2 boys from our class which altogether had 4 groups. One of them must be right – handed, another left – handed partner and vice versa so both can utilize their strong side.

They tie the rope securely around the touching ankles. The game is then ready to start and end successfully after 15 minutes. The children had lots of fun. They were too attached with the students.



The next game was called bowling ball with cups. As before, the children were divided into groups of 5 each. The students arranged the cups according to the order. Each person was given one chance to play. Each team must aim to knock down all the cups. Lastly, the students organized the game musical chairs using papers. The papers were placed in a round. Once the music is turned on, the children walked around the papers. When the music stops, the children race to step in the empty paper. The player who gets left out of empty papers was taken out of the game. This repeated and in each round an empty paper will be taken out. The last child who stands in the paper was announced as the winner.

After the gaming session, the students had a small lesson teaching the children handicrafts. The children were divided into two groups. This lesson lasted for 15 min. the children were super excited and paid full attention to it.

Seeing children who have next to nothing smiled as if they have the world is a truly amazing sight. Initially the children were timid and curious as to what a bunch of strangers were doing visiting the children but within a few minutes of us being there we never experienced a group of children



wanting as much love and attention as these. The committees ended the event by giving goody bags, gifts and closing speech by Shafeezaah one the representative student and also by the centre owner, Ms Aspalela. The students also provided the children and the centre organizers with a nice lunch. They even had a photo session with the children and the centre organizers. The event finished at 2.00 pm, and the committee members cleaned up everything before they went back.
